Preparation:

- Visit the NASA website to download a pdf of the night sky for the month <u>http://earthsky.org/tonight</u>
- Visit an observatory or planetarium
- Ask a member of Astronomy Ireland to visit your summer camp and show you the constellations on their telescope.

Tagann- Choose campfire songs about stars or the moon that will make the Cub Pack happy








Do

- Have sketches based on life on other planets
- You are planning a manned space mission to Jupiter.
 Only one Cub will be chosen to go on this mission. Each Cub who volunteers to go on this mission must convince the rest of the Pack why he/she is the obvious choice. A vote will decide the winning candidate
- Make cardboard star discs of the most common constellations using the template on the next page. Tie them together with string or ribbon.
